I was born in Montreal, Canada, in 1973 of Egyptian immigrant parents. All my family are Christians on both sides and, as a matter of fact, I recently discovered that I come from a very long line of faithful Christians. We were Abd-El-Nessih (“adoring the Messiah”) and Antaki (from Antioch) on my mom’s side by way of Palestine and El-Issa (Jesus) on my father’s side by way of Crete and Cypress. However, growing up, all I knew was that my grandmothers had lanterns and icons and we were Greek Orthodox but little else. My father has always prayed every day, but it seemed to me it was a private ritual, and he never shared his faith with me. So, I grew up in Catholic Montreal going to a Greek Orthodox church maybe once a year and when I did, the service was in Greek, so I did not understand. Even on our wedding day, there were so many rituals to observe, like circling the altar three times and wearing golden crowns, but I failed to grasp the meaning of any of it. I now realise that what I was missing was someone to share Jesus with me - I think my family expected our generation to catch on by osmosis! Anyhow, I believe this is why I have such a thirst for learning about God and a passion for sharing the Gospel, starting with my family. It was not until we moved to California in 2011, that I finally heard the message of the Gospel at Trinity. It was then that my heart broke open; it was then that I saw so clearly how God had been relentlessly pursuing me all my life and preparing me and guiding me, and our family, to this point. It all started with a simple invitation from Cindy Slay, Pastor Jeff Wagner’s sister. God provided a lovely friend for our daughter Léa, in kindergarten, in the person of Katie Slay. Those two have just started 7th grade, by the way, and are still the best of friends. Cindy invited Léa to join the choir at Trinity and so, despite our initial misgivings about church, Josh and I came to hear her sing. I soon found that I wanted to come every Sunday, singing or no singing. Those first two or three years were wonderful yet difficult. I was parched and could not be filled quickly enough; I joined an anchor group with Sherry Metcalfe and read through The Story, which was my first exposure to the Word of God. At the same time, my husband Josh was struggling with his faith, not having been brought up in the church at all. There were many prayers (and many tears) at that time. In Summer 2013, I had a medical scare and that precipitated my growth while also motivating Josh in his walk of faith. I remember, one Sunday during that summer we sang the song “Jesus Saves” in the Sanctuary and I broke down and said Yes! That’s what I want! And invited Jesus into my heart. I did not know about the ABC’s of faith or anything else, all I knew was that I wanted, needed, Jesus in my life. I am glad to say that Josh eventually came to feel that way too and our girls have been Christians for as long as they can remember. For the past four years now, I have been studying Precepts with Jessica Gazzaniga and that, along with the amazing teaching from the pulpit here at Trinity, has been life changing. We started by studying Romans in Precepts and that was my first Bible study ever and it was in the Foundations of our Faith, how perfect! We moved on to Daniel the following year and then Luke last year and we have just started the Book of Acts. This past summer, I also had the privilege of joining Marsha Butler and some fantastic ladies from Trinity in a study on the Letter of James, which was a real blessing and has been very helpful in anchoring spiritual discipline in my daily life. I cannot begin to express how thankful I am for the journey I am on, for the wonderful fellowship here at Trinity, for the teaching and the grace and compassion God has shown in bringing us here. Our life is radically different than what it once was – I am a completely transformed person and I know that I owe it all to God. I really seek to share that with all those around me. Our two daughters will readily say that there are “cringy” moments, as they put it, when I invite people and acquaintances to church or events. I just don’t want anyone to miss Jesus, like I did until I was 40 years old! I now know that in Jesus we have everything and apart from Him, we have nothing. The thought that I could have lived the next forty years of my life like the first forty years motivates me into action. I also want to take up the torch

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that was handed down through past generations in my family and make sure that I disciple my children and pray that they will, in turn, disciple their children and grandchildren.
