My Christian Ed Director witnessed to me as a seventh grader at winter camp. I gave my life to Jesus on my bed after camp. I was a lonely child from an alcoholic family. Jesus, through the spirit, pointed out that I would never be alone again. The first clue about my journey was a Christian sister challenging me that I don't walk my talk as a freshman in college. Having done poorly in college and thinking that my aspirations for medicine were gone I enrolled in Fuller seminary thinking I would be a pastor. The

required presbytery psych evaluation and vocational counseling revealed that I should pursue medicine, so I dropped out and went to take my premed classes over again. I was a member of the Local Church after a split in the Soledad Presbyterian Church. It was a very intense word church movement. I ended up being admitted to a Pentecostal medical school and began to be exposed to miracles and healing. I met Lise in August 1986 after feeling led to attend her Sunday school hour. We hammered out our relationship over \$3000 dollars in phone calls between San Diego and Tulsa. I proposed on Thanksgiving break. She joined me in January to finish her masters where I was in medical school.

In the severe fatigue of long hours in pediatric residency, the wounds of my unhealthy childhood began to surface, and I fell away from the Lord. I became an angry, controlling person who could not cope with the challenges of marriage and parenthood of four kids, leaving Lise to do it all. Lise would encourage me to pray and read the word, but I wouldn't. This went on for 20 years. I became addicted to the computer. I had a hypercritical Director for 13 years who made me furious and destroyed my self-esteem.

Lise began to pray fix him or take him. So, in 2011 I had a heart attack. I realized I needed and wanted my relationships and my Savior. I went through 10-11 sessions of inner healing forgiving everyone before Jesus who had hurt me including that Director who died the same hour I forgave her.

I gave up self-ambition and control; I wanted to be like the woman who washed Jesus feet with her tears and wiped them with her hair. My marriage and relationships with my children were restored. I have been at Trinity for 21 years and want to bring my heart of service to church leadership.

I bring my joy and peace and unabashed witness of Jesus to work as a pediatric endocrinologist. I am a mentor to HS and college summer interns in the hospital in medical innovation.

I grew up in Taiwan a non-religious home, values were established on Chinese traditional values fostered at home by my father and Confucious's teaching from school. Most people around were culturally Buddhist, Christianity was minority. My only contacts with Christianity were a childhood best friend who invited me to her Christmas play at a small church where she attended with her grandma, and a high

school art teacher who invited me to her church's Thanksgiving potluck.

#### Seed Awakened

At 33, my life was at breaking point even though I had achieved academically, married, blessed with two sons, and very supportive parents, but parents' distant water can no longer put off near fire. A Taiwanese colleague invited me to her congregation's new branch church in Irvine. One Sunday afternoon I brought my two young sons to attend this church located at a warehouse of a company. That was my first sermon in Taiwanese, it was sweeter than anything I have ever heard up to that point of my life. Since then, I have never left the church of Jesus Christ.

#### Transformation Miraculously Started

Unfamiliar with Christianity at the time, after the first taste of sweetness of spiritual messages, I only knew to religiously attend the church, follow the service flow, read the Bible, but it was dry and un-interesting. Only after the pastor visited me to share who God is, my colleague invited me to her living room for a 6-week one-on-one bible study, I was marveling on how God's view is so different than the world's view. It gave me hope and strength. At my brokenness God's words started penetrating my thoughts and transforming me. Later at Dr. Robert Schuller's church, his possibility and positive thinking messages were inspirations to me. In my alone time, I started to hear God's whispers and experience Him.

I no longer live like driftwood in a river, but am planted by the rivers of water, anchored in Christian life. # Muriel Morse Nominating Committee


I grew up in a loving, church-going family and accepted Jesus as my own personal Savior at summer camp as I entered the fourth grade.
